




Woonsocket's Child Population, 2010



- Decreasing child population overall.
- Increasing percentage of children Hispanic/Latino.

Mother's Education Level, 2007-2011



- Strong links between parent education levels and a child's health and education outcomes.
- 1 in 4 new mothers in Woonsocket have less than a high school diploma.



Infants Born at Highest Risk

Mother:

Under Age 20

Unmarried

Without High School Degree



Child:

More likely to grow up in poverty

More likely to suffer from abuse or neglect

Less likely to be ready for school at kindergarten entry

Less likely to perform well in school

Less likely to complete high school

In 2012...

- > 351 (3%) Rhode Island babies were born with all three risk factors.
- > 32 (6%) Woonsocket babies were born at highest risk.

Child Poverty Defined, 2012

Poverty level

- > \$18,498 for a family of three with two children
- > \$23,283 for a family of four with two children

Extreme poverty level

- > \$9,249 for a family of three with two children
- > \$11,642 for a family of four with two children.

• 2012 Rhode Island Standard of Need

➤ Single parent with two young children would need \$49,272/year to pay basic living

Concentrated Child Poverty


Almost two-thirds (65%) of Rhode Island's children living in poverty live in just four cities

Disparities in Poverty Rates


Children in Poverty, by Race and Ethnicity, Rhode Island, 2009-2011



- Half of all poor children in Rhode Island are White,
- **BUT** minority children are much more likely to be living in poverty than their White peers.

Cost of Housing

Average Cost of a Two-Bedroom Apartment 2000-2012



To afford the average rent in Rhode Island without a cost burden...

A worker would need to earn 3 times the state's 2012 minimum wage of \$7.40 per hour.

A family of three living at the poverty level in Woonsocket...

> would have to devote 64% of its household income to the cost of rent.

Homeless Children & Youth

In 2012, 1,277 children stayed in a homeless shelter or a domestic violence shelter in RI.


➤ Woonsocket was the last permanent residence for more than 9% (119) of these children.

During the 2011-2012 school year, Rhode Island public school personnel identified 961 children as homeless.

➤ Woonsocket Public Schools personnel identified 59 children as homeless.

- 64% decline in Rhode Island cash assistance caseload.
- 14% (1,393) of children in Woonsocket receive cash assistance.
- 68% of RI Works beneficiaries are children under age 18.
- In SFY 2012, the state budget included no state general revenue for cash assistance.



Children Participating in School Breakfast


% of Low-Income Children Participating in School Breakfast, 2012




- 1 of 5 school districts which offers free breakfast to all children regardless of income.

Health



Children Without Health Insurance, Rhode Island, 1991-2011



- In Rhode Island between 2009 and 2011...
 - > 5.9% of children under age 18 were uninsured
 - ➤ Rhode Island ranks 10th best in the country
- Children in families with incomes up to 250% FPL are eligible for RIte Care.



Children with Elevated Blood Lead Levels

Children Entering Kindergarten with History of Elevated Blood Lead Level Screening, Rhode Island and Four Core Cities, 1998-2014



- The CDC lowered threshold for elevated blood lead level from 10 mcg/dL to 5 mcg/dL.
- 631 Woonsocket children due to enter kindergarten in the fall of 2014
 - \triangleright 65 (10.3%) were confirmed positive for ≥5 mcg/dL (new level)
 - \triangleright 9 (1.4%) were confirmed positive for ≥10 mcg/dL (old level)

Child Hospitalizations With Primary Diagnosis of Asthma, Four Core Cities and Rhode Island, 2007-2011



- One of the most common chronic conditions.
- Third-ranked cause of hospitalization for children under age 15.
- Leading cause of school absences among children in the U.S.



Births to Teens, 2007-2011



- Second highest teen birth rate for girls ages 15-19 (71.4 births per 1,000 girls) in the state.
- Between 2007 and 2011, 82 births in Woonsocket were repeat teen births, making up 18.2% of the 450 total teen births during that period.



- Nationally, 2,711 children and youth under age 20 were killed by firearms during 2010
 - ➤ 86% (2,331) were ages 15 to 19.
- In Rhode Island in 2011,
 - ➤ 11% of high school students reported they carried a weapon in the 30 days compared with 17% of U.S. high school students.

Juveniles Referred to Family Court and at the RITS

Juveniles in the Care and Custody of the Rhode Island Training School, 2003-2012



- Major decreases in youth referred to family court and in the custody of Training School
- In 2012, 5% of juvenile offenses involved violent offenses.






Victims of Child Abuse and Neglect per 1,000 children, 2012



• Woonsocket's child abuse and neglect victim rate is the highest in the state.






Head Start and Early Head Start

Access to Head Start, Four Core Cities, 2012




Access to Early Head Start, Four Core Cities, 2012


In Woonsocket:



Children in Full-Day Public Kindergarten Programs, Rhode Island, 2000-2001 through 2012-2013 School Years





- 68% of Rhode Island kindergartners were in full-day programs.
- 77% of U.S. kindergartners were in full-day programs.
- 3% of Woonsocket kindergartners were in a full-day programs.

Chronic Early Absence






Definition: The percentage of children in grades K-3 who miss at least 10% of the school year (i.e., 18 days or more), including excused and unexcused absences.

Woonsocket has the highest chronic early absence rate in the state -25%.


36% of Woonsocket middle school students miss 18+ days.

Disciplinary Actions

- During the 2011-2012 school year, Woonsocket had the highest suspension rate in the state.
 - 93 disciplinary actions per 100 students in Woonsocket
 - 82% in-school suspensions
 - 18% out-of-school suspensions
 - 30 disciplinary actions per 100 students in Rhode Island

Fourth Grade Reading Skills



- Between 2005 and 2012, Woonsocket's 4th grade reading proficiency rate has increased from 46% to 56%, however progress has slowed since 2008.
- 3rd lowest 4th grade reading proficiency level in the state.



High School Graduation and Dropout Rates



Woonsocket's high school graduation rate has increased by 11% since 2007.

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
