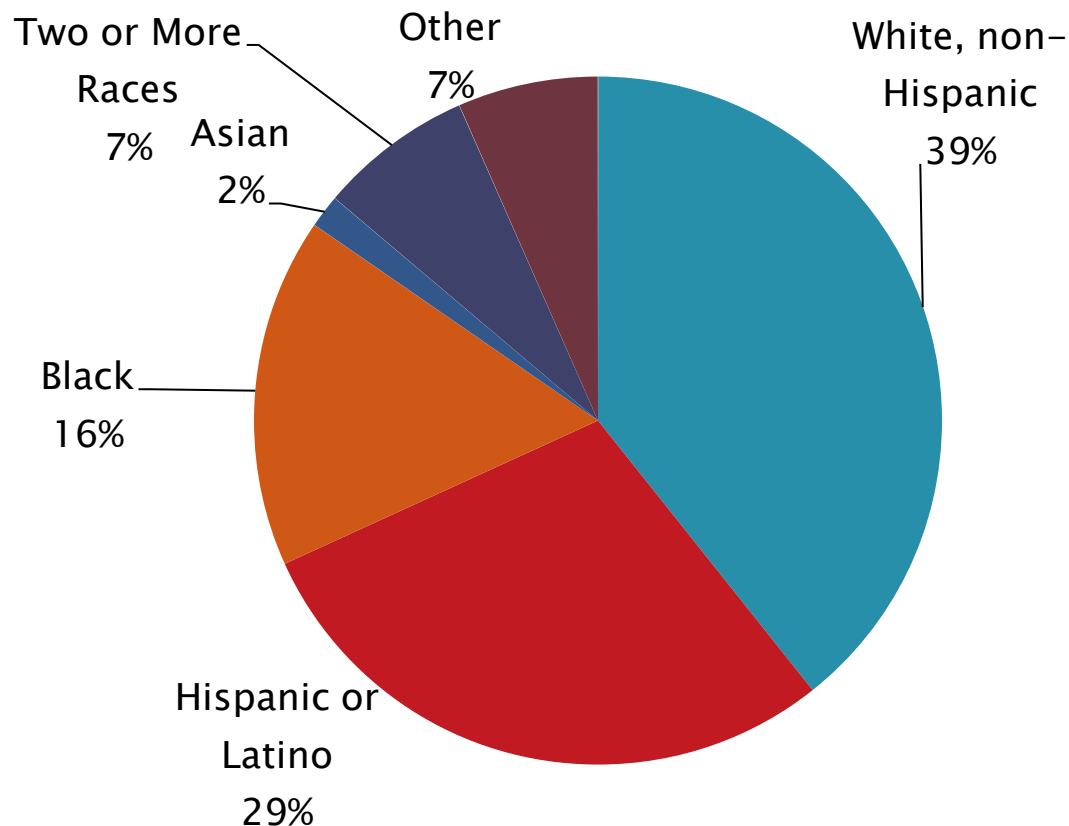

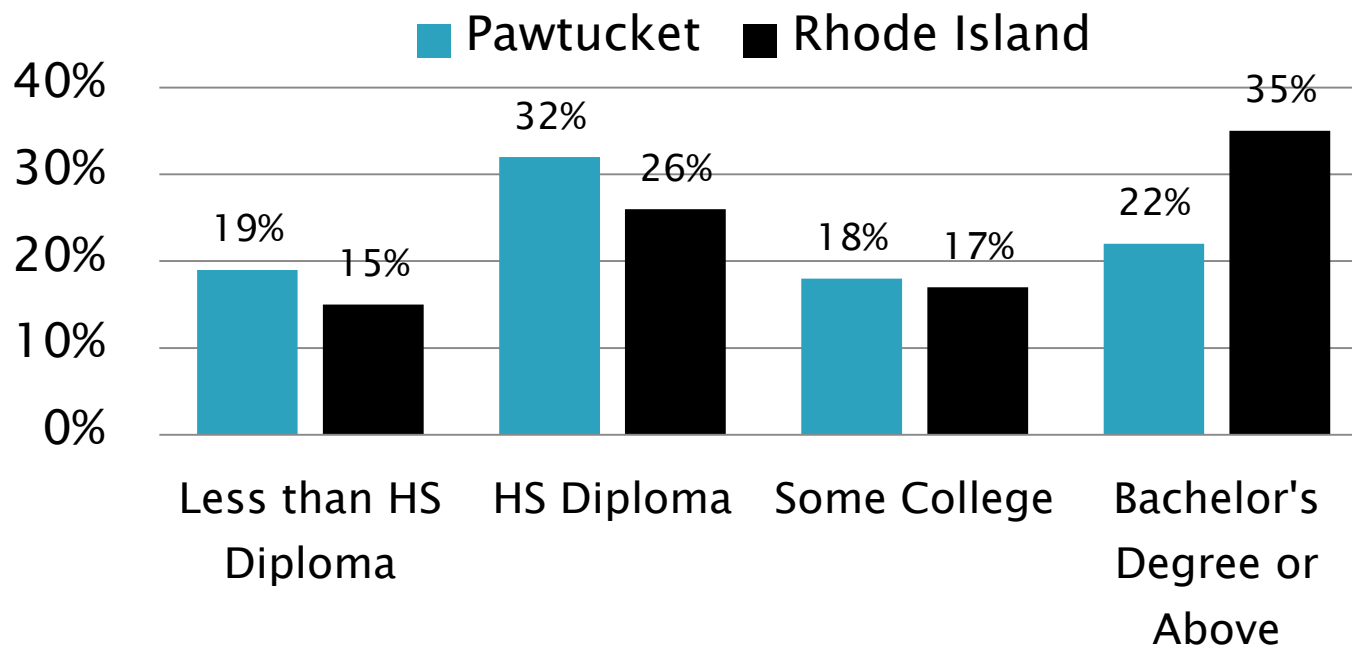
Family and Community

Child Population, 2010



- Child population down 9% from 2000
- Increasing racial/ethnic diversity

- Strong links between parental education levels and child well-being



Economic Well-Being

Child Poverty Defined, 2013

- **Poverty level**

- \$18,769 for a family of 3
- \$23,624 for a family of 4

- **Extreme poverty level**

- \$9,385 for a family of 3
- \$11,812 for a family of 4

- ***2012 Rhode Island Standard of Need***

- Single-parent family with 2 children would need \$49,272 a year to meet its basic needs

Concentrated Child Poverty

- Almost two-thirds (64%) of Rhode Island's children living in poverty live in just 4 cities.

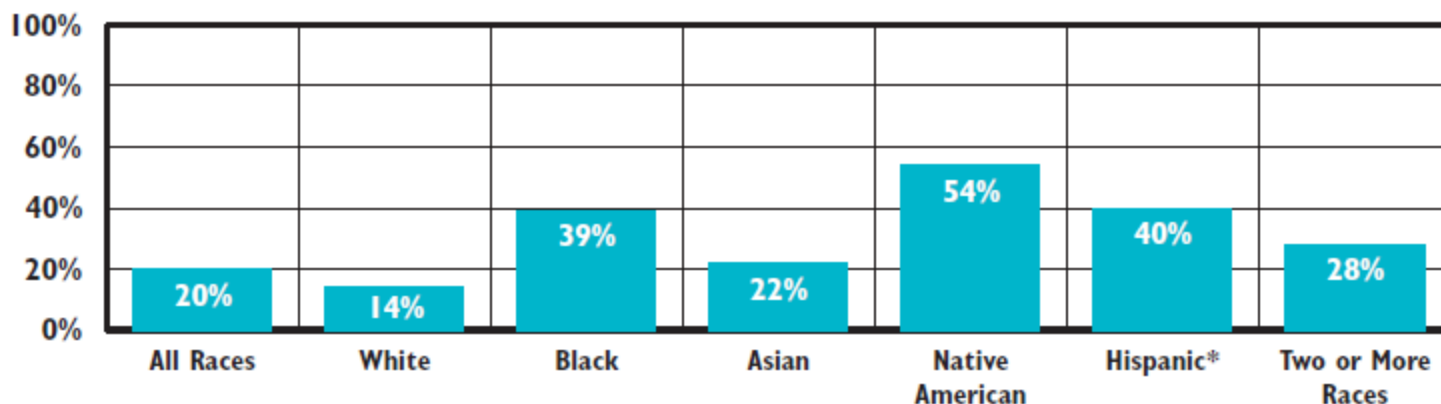

Poverty by Race/Ethnicity

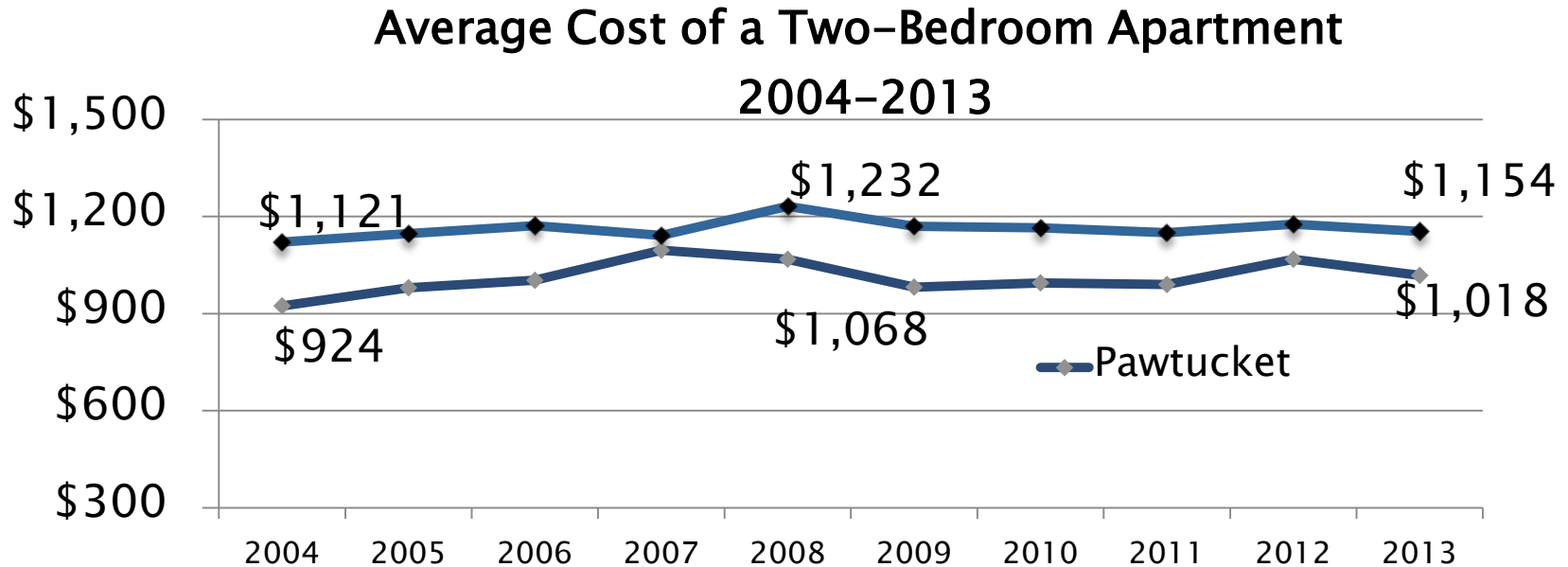
Children in Poverty, by Race and Ethnicity, Rhode Island, 2010-2012

- Hispanic, Black, and Native American children are more likely to live in poverty than White and Asian children.

Cost of Housing



To afford the average rent in Rhode Island without a cost burden...

- A worker would need to earn nearly 3 times the state's 2013 minimum wage of \$7.75 per hour.

A family of three living at the poverty level in Pawtucket...

- would have to devote 63% of its household income to the cost of rent.

Homeless Children

In 2013, 1,117 children stayed in a homeless shelter or a domestic violence shelter in RI.

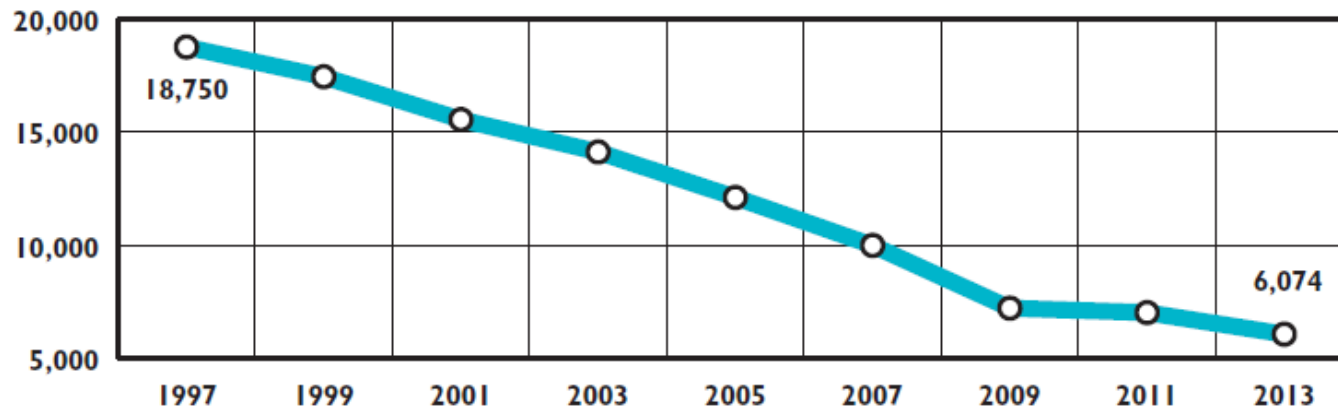
- Pawtucket was the last permanent residence for more than 4% (49) of these children.

During the 2012–2013 school year, Rhode Island public school personnel identified 923 children as homeless.

- Pawtucket Public Schools personnel identified 27 children as homeless.

Cash Assistance Caseload, Rhode Island, 1997-2013*

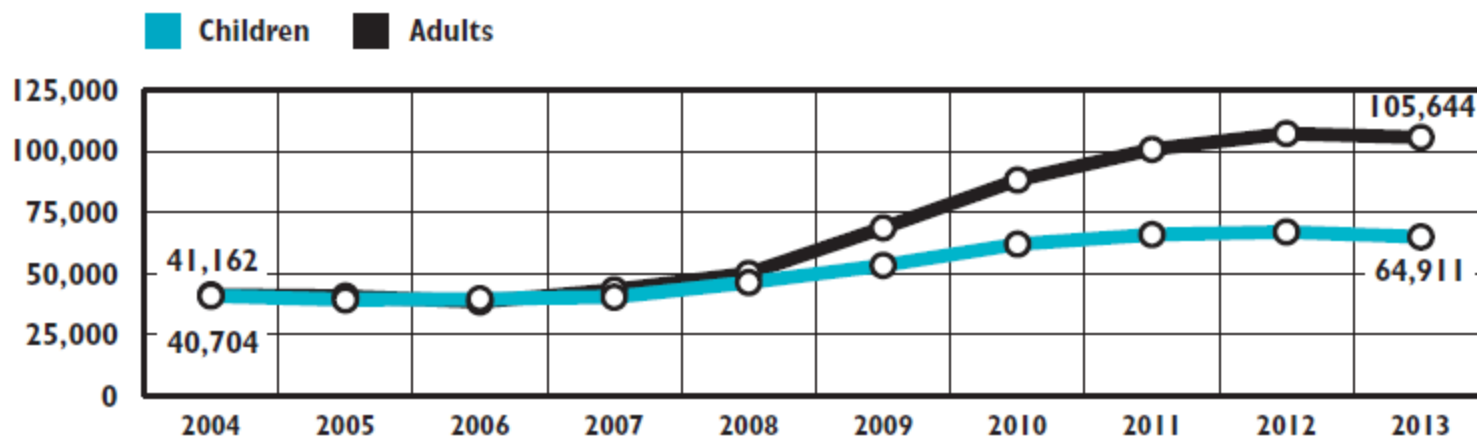

This change is reflected in 2010-2013 caseload data. Comparisons to earlier years should be made with caution.

- 67% decline in Rhode Island cash assistance caseload.
- 6% (1,047) of children in Pawtucket receive cash assistance.
- 69% of RI Works beneficiaries are children under age 18.
- In SFY 2013, for the fourth year in a row, the state budget included no state general revenue for cash assistance.

Participation in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, Children and Adults, Rhode Island, 2004-2013



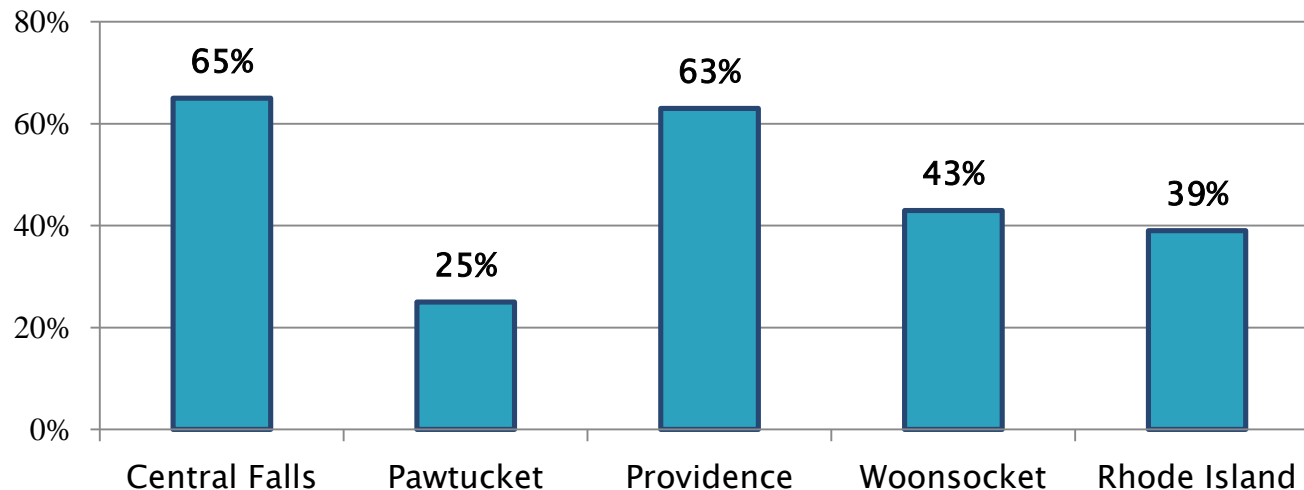

In October 2013

- 7,414 Pawtucket children were receiving SNAP benefits.
- 62% increase from 2008.

% of Low-Income Children Participating in School Breakfast, 2013



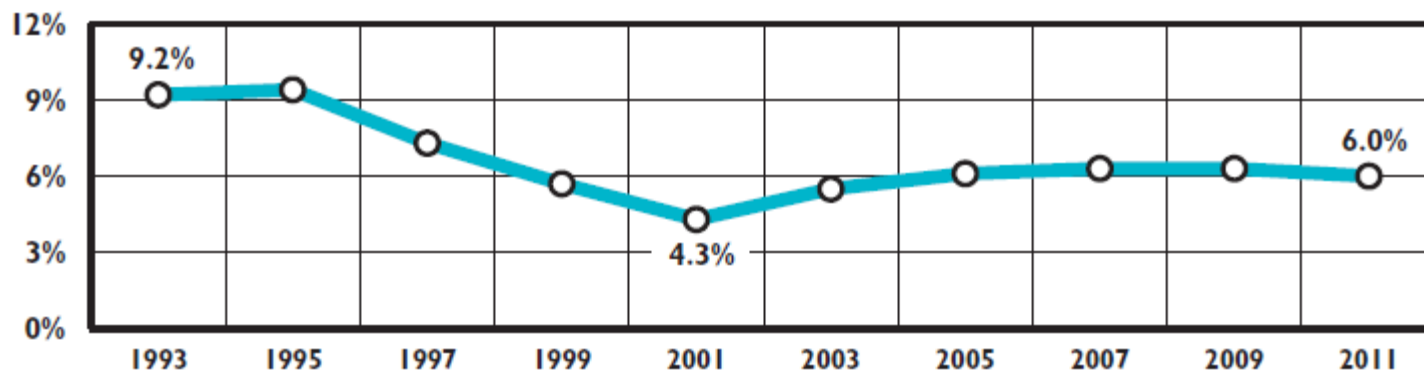
- 1 of 5 school districts which offers free breakfast to all children regardless of income.
- Could increase participation by offering in-classroom breakfast as Central Falls and Providence do.

- **In Rhode Island between 2010 and 2012**
 - 6.0% of children under age 18 were uninsured
 - Rhode Island ranks 10th best in the country
- 71% of uninsured children are income-eligible for Rite Care.

In 2013...

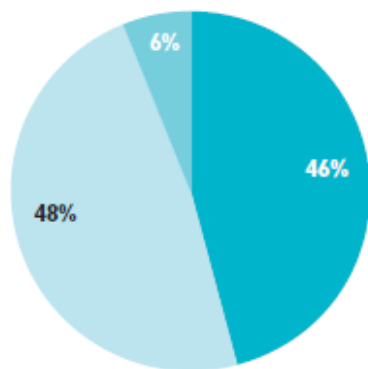
- 290 (3%) Rhode Island babies were born with all three risk factors, down from 5% in 2009.
- **22 (2%) Pawtucket babies were born at highest risk, down from 7% in 2009**

Families Enrolled in Evidence-Based Home Visiting Programs, Rhode Island, October 2013

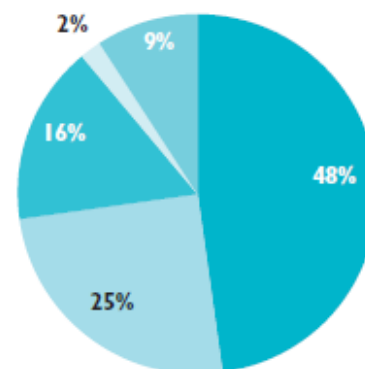

- Families are enrolled in Healthy Families America, Nurse-Family Partnership, and Parents as Teachers programs.

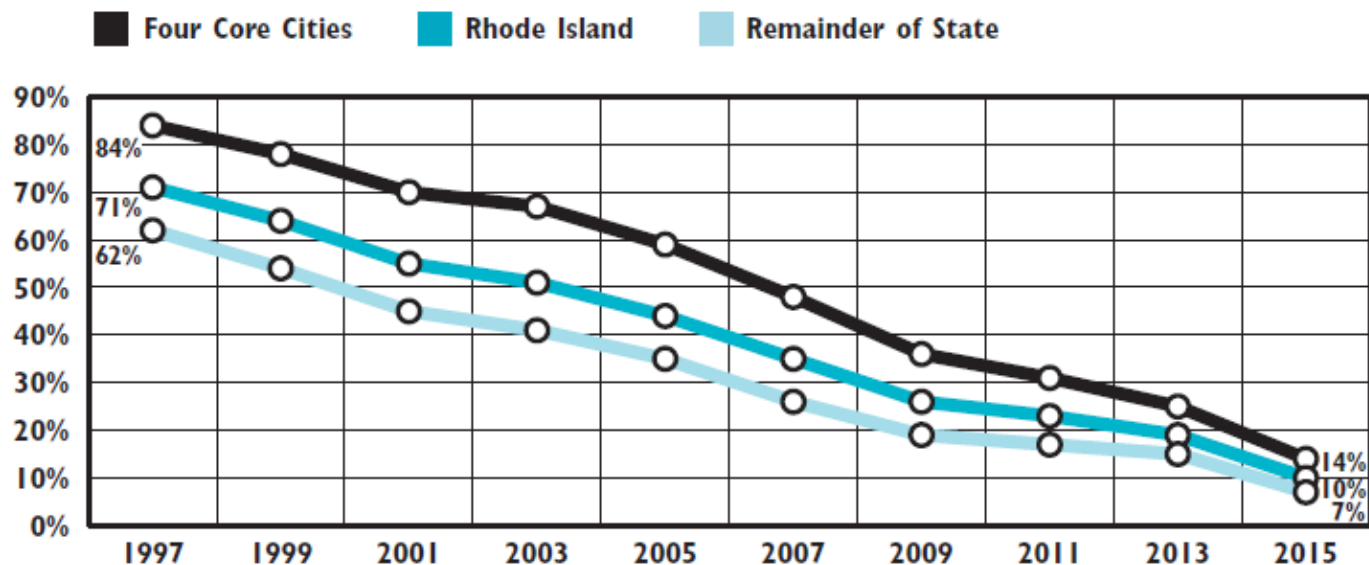

Children with Lead Poisoning

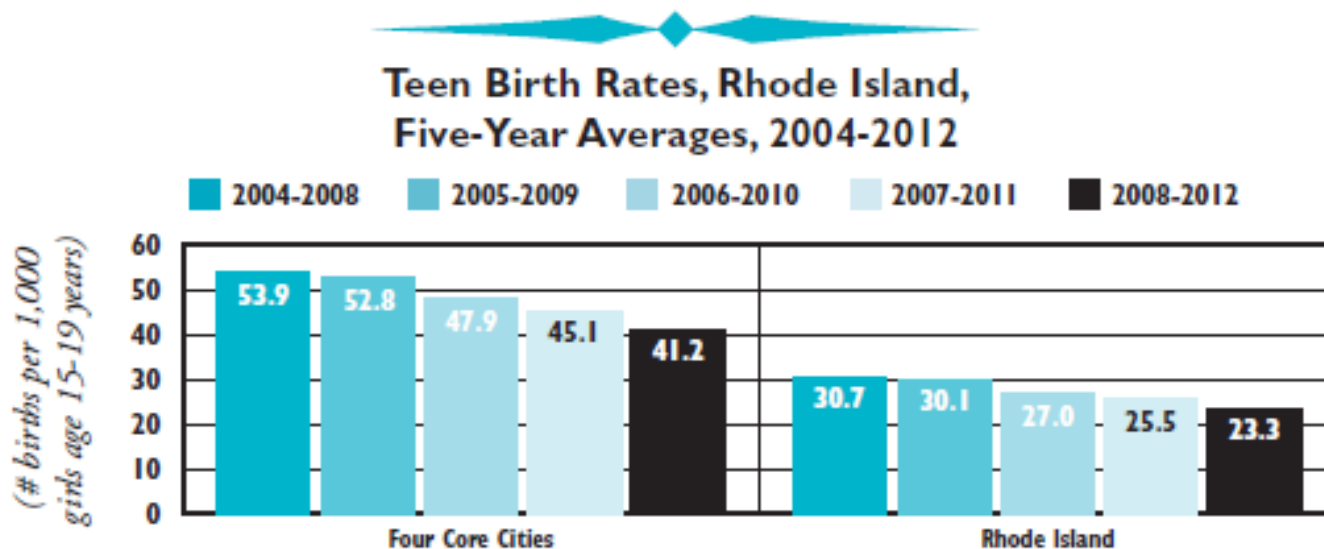

- **942 Pawtucket children due to enter kindergarten in the fall of 2015**
 - 98 (10.4%) were confirmed positive for $\geq 5 \text{ mcg/dL}$

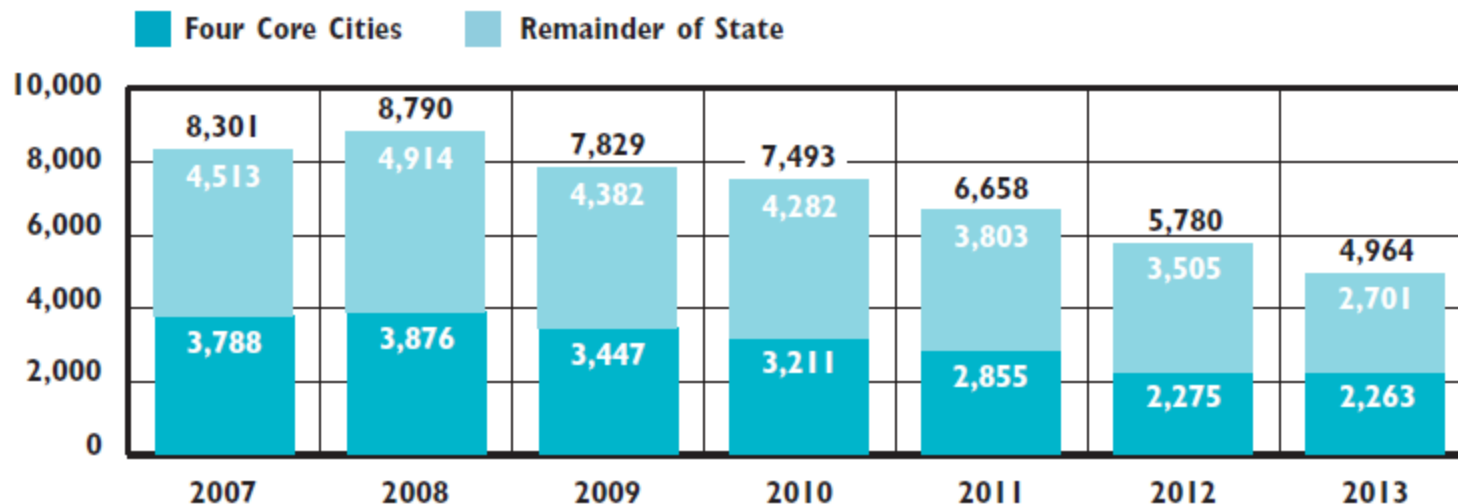
- Teen birth rate on the decline nationally, in Rhode Island, and in Pawtucket.
- 44.2 teen births per 1,000 girls ages 15–19 in Pawtucket from 2008–2012, down from 58.7 teen births per 1,000 from 2004–2008.
- In Pawtucket, between 2008 and 2012, 76 births were repeat teen births, making up 14.7% of the 516 total teen births during that period.



Safety

- 45% decline in youth referred to Family Court from 2007 to 2013

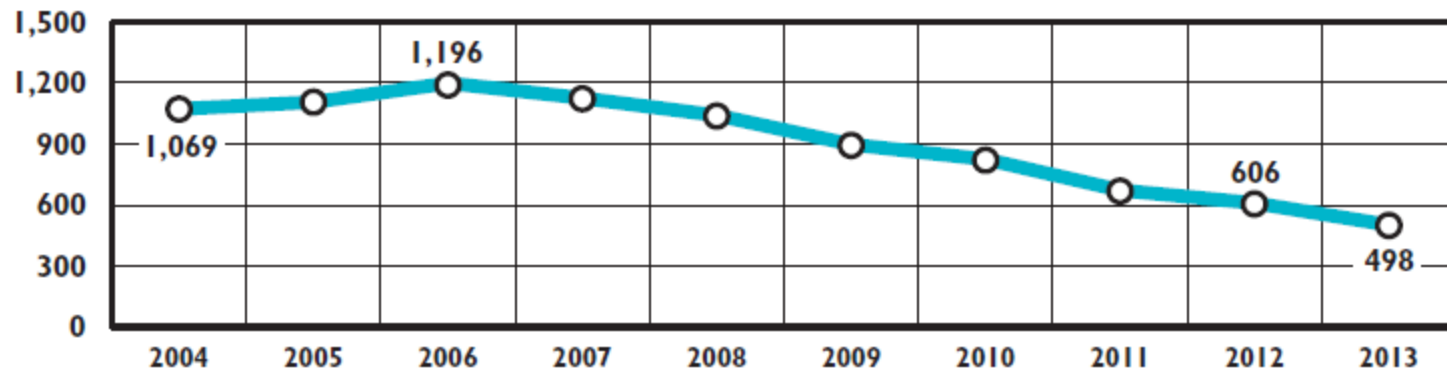
**Status offenses are age-related acts that would not be punishable if the offender were an adult, such as truancy and disobedient conduct.*

***Other includes offenses such as conspiracy, crank/obscene phone calls, computer crimes and possession of a manipulative device for automobiles, etc. Probation violations, contempt of court, and other violations of court orders are not included in the offenses above.*

- 5% (260) of offenses for which youth were referred to Family Court in 2013 involved violent offenses.

Juveniles at the Training School

Juveniles in the Care and Custody of
the Rhode Island Training School, Calendar Years 2004-2013



- 498 youth were in the care or custody of the Training School at some point during 2013, down from 1,069 in 2004.
- In 2008, the Rhode Island General Assembly instituted a cap on the number of youth at the Training School. On any given day, the limit is 148 boys and 12 girls.

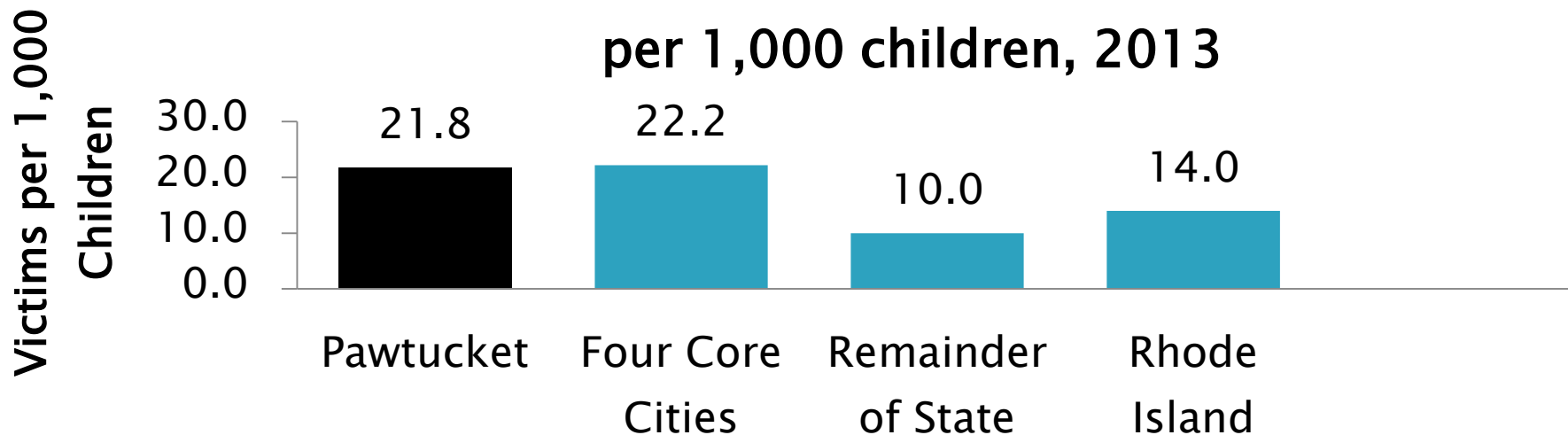

- On September 30, 2013:
 - 117 incarcerated parents with a known in-state residence identified Pawtucket as their last place of residence.
 - These parents reported 360 children

Victims of Child Abuse and Neglect per 1,000 children, 2013



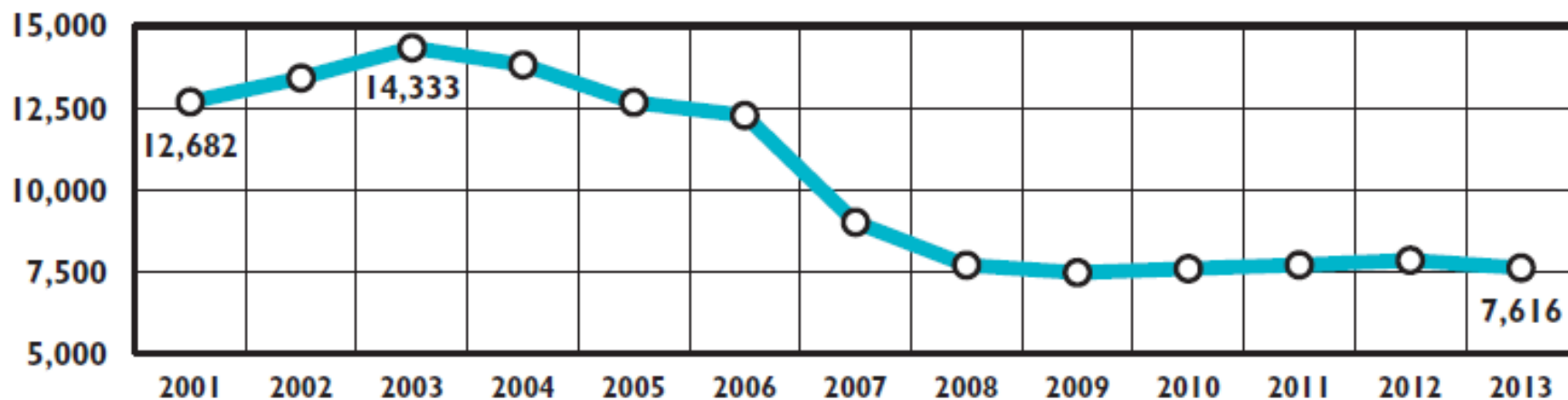
- Pawtucket's child abuse and neglect victim rate is almost twice as high as the state as a whole.
- Vast majority of child abuse and neglect victims statewide experienced neglect (79%).

Child Care Subsidies, Rhode Island, 2001-2013

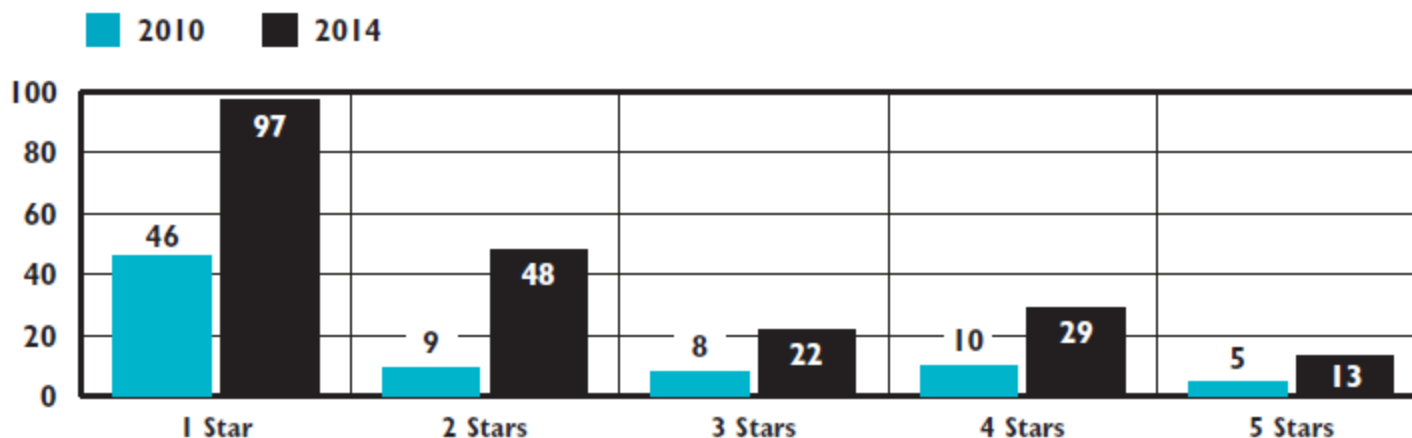

Quality Ratings of Early Learning Programs Participating in BrightStars, Rhode Island, 2010 and 2014



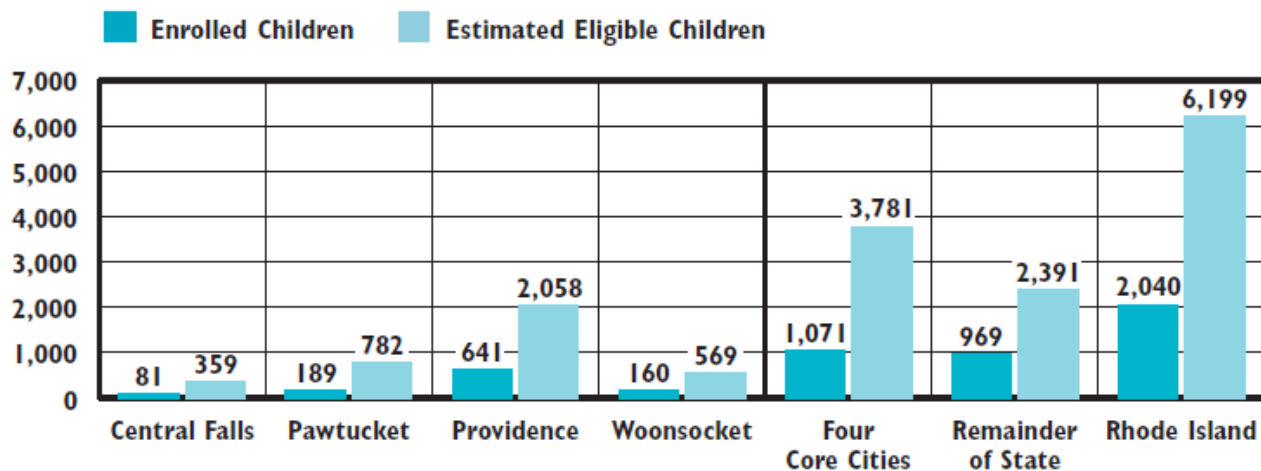

In Pawtucket:

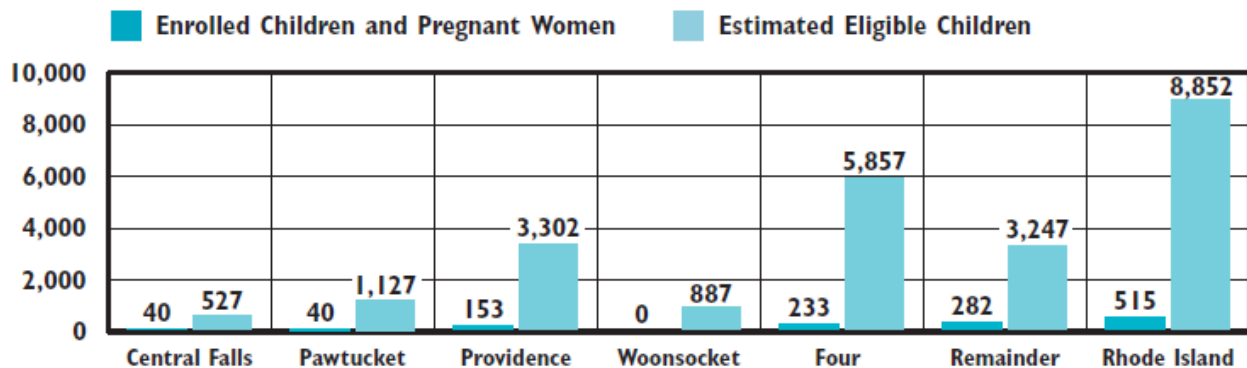
- 88% of child care centers and preschools participate in BrightStars
 - 25% have a quality rating
- 85% of family child care homes participate in BrightStars
 - 35% have a quality rating

Access to Head Start for Low-Income Children, Rhode Island, 2013

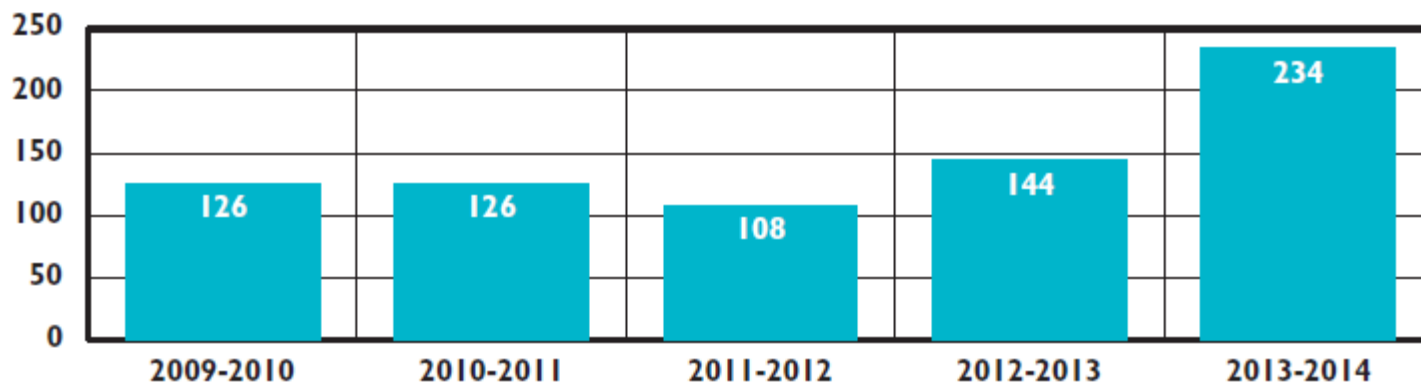


Access to Early Head Start for Low-Income Children and Pregnant Women, Rhode Island, 2013

Rhode Island State Pre-K Funded Slots, 2009-2010 through 2013-2014

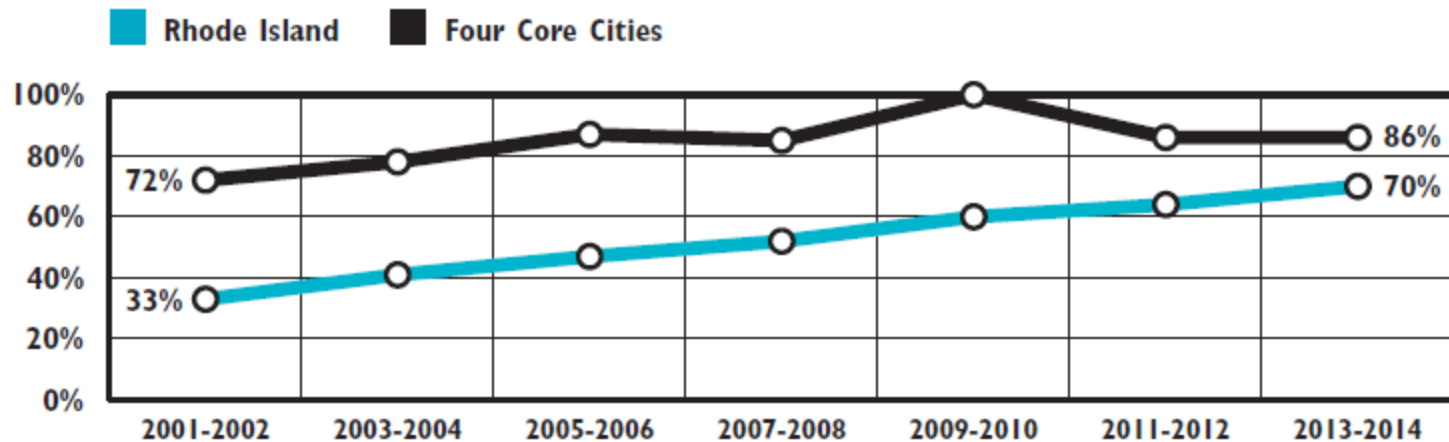

Children in Full-Day Public Kindergarten Programs, Rhode Island, 2001-2002 through 2013-2014 School Years



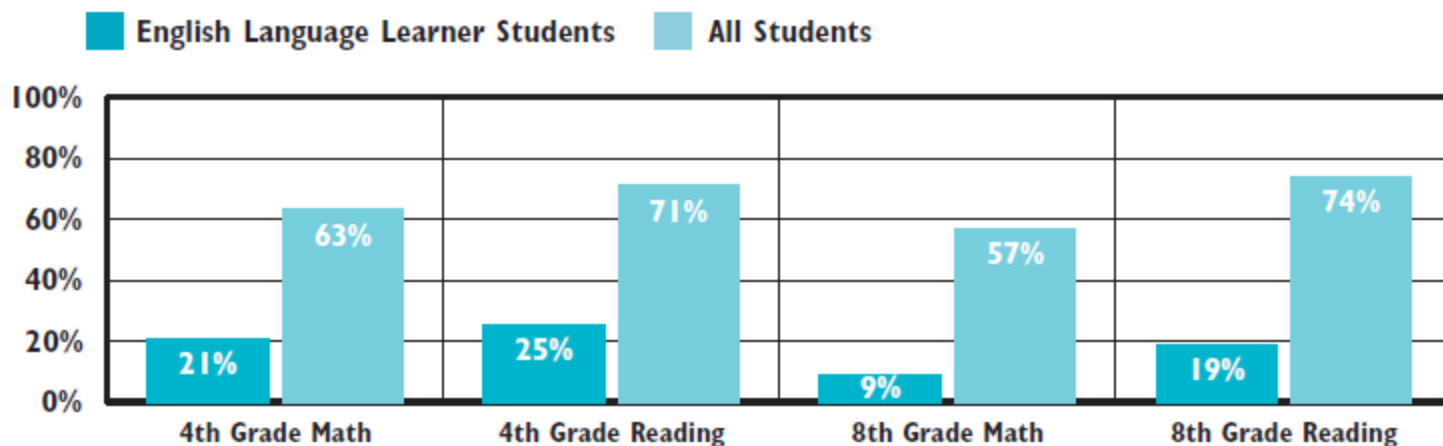

- 100% of Pawtucket kindergartners were in full-day programs.

Current English Language Learners' Mathematics and Reading Proficiency, Rhode Island, 2013



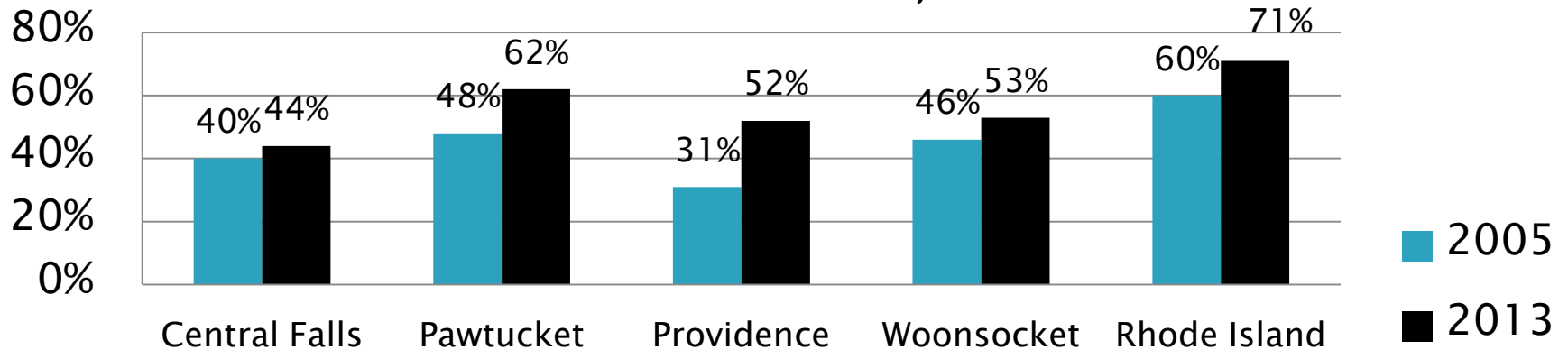

- Only Central Falls and Providence had higher percentages of ELL students.

Fourth-Grade Reading Proficiency % At or Above the Proficiency Level

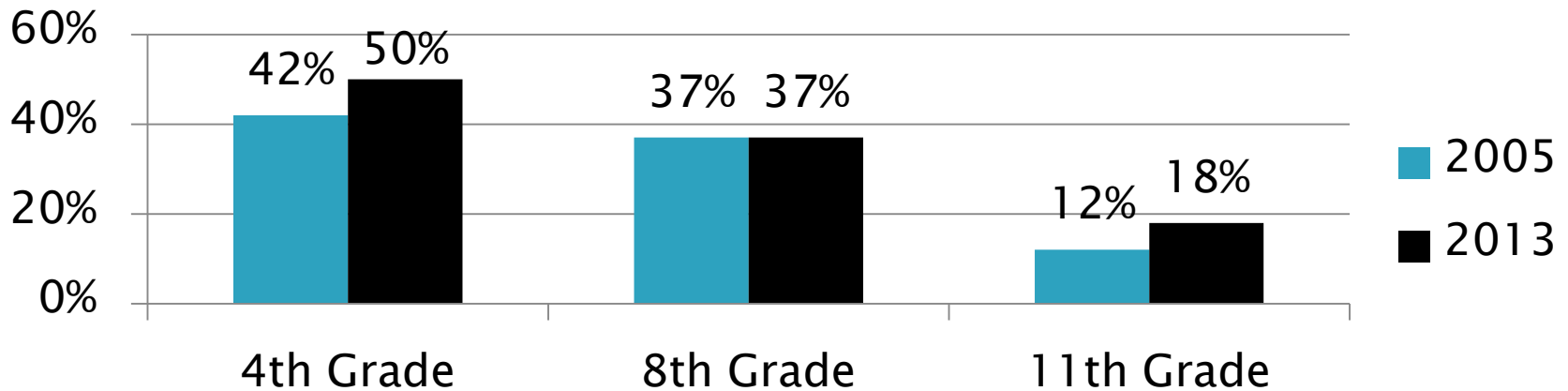
Four Core Cities and Rhode Island, 2005 & 2013



- Between 2005 and 2013, Pawtucket's 4th grade reading proficiency rate increased from 48% to 62%.
- However reading proficiency rates appear to be leveling off, with little improvement in the past three years, and reading proficiency rates remain below the state rate.

Math Proficiency, Pawtucket, 2005 and 2013

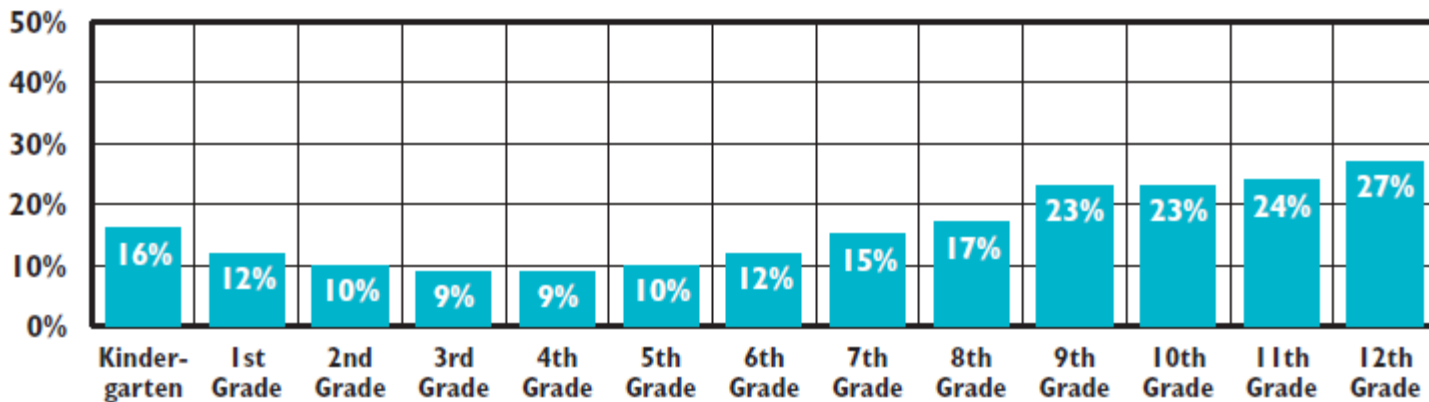


Note: 2007 is the first year that 11th grade students participated in the *NECAP*.

- Pawtucket is seeing some improvement in 4th and 11th grade math proficiency, but continues to have proficiency rates that are among the lowest in the state.

Chronic Absence Rates in Rhode Island by Grade, 2012-2013 School Year

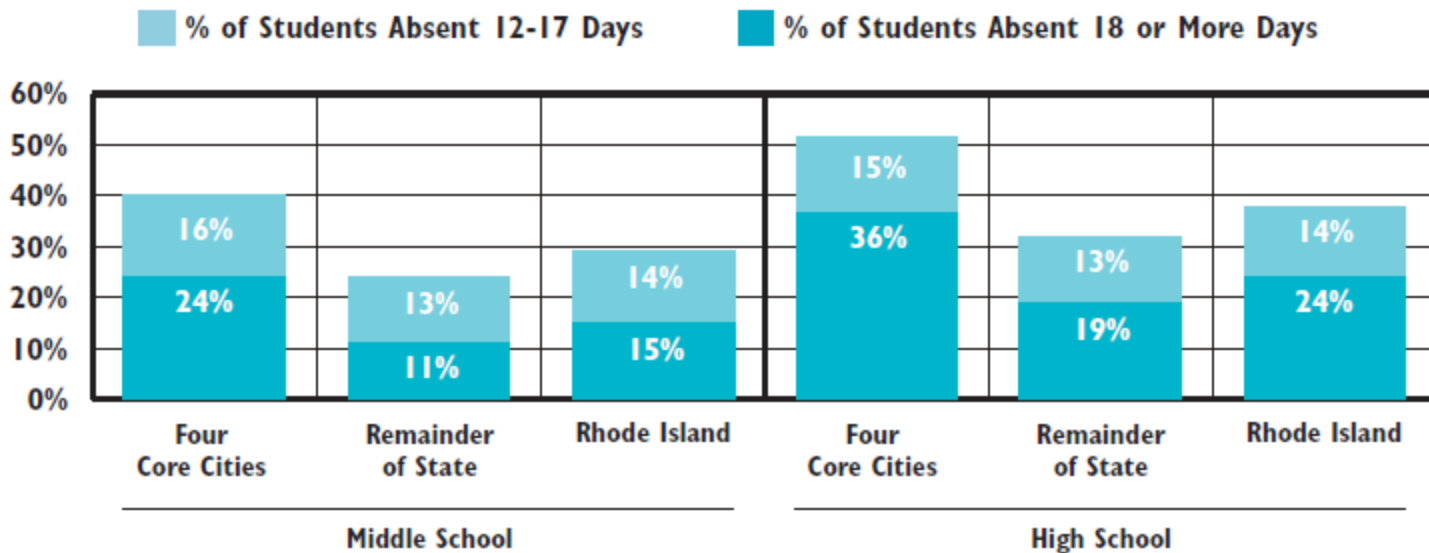

- Pawtucket's chronic early absence rate (grades K-3) has decreased from 14% during the 2009-2010 school year to 10% during the 2012-2013 school year and is below the state rate of 12%.

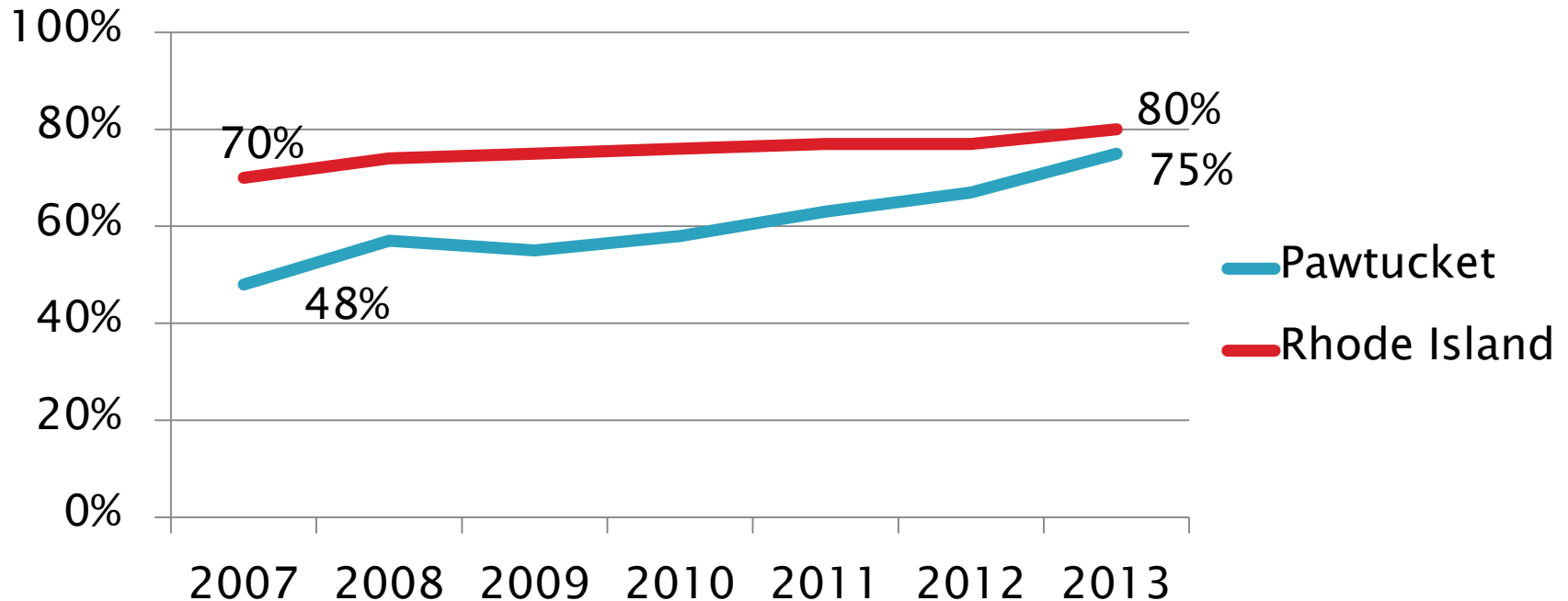
- Pawtucket's chronic absence rate in high school has decreased from 37% during the 2009–2010 school year to 20% during the 2012–2013 school year and is below the state rate of 24%.

School Suspensions

- **Substantial decline in school suspensions**
 - 2011–2012 school year – 55 per 100 students
 - 2012–2013 school year – 14 per 100 students

- **During the 2012–2013 school year, still mostly out-of-school suspensions**
 - 1,147 out-of-school suspensions
 - 102 in-school suspensions

High School Graduation Rate, 2007–2013



- The Pawtucket 4-year graduation rate for the Class of 2013 was 75%, the dropout rate was 13%, 5% completed their GED within 4 years of entering high school, and 7% were still in school in the fall of 2013.

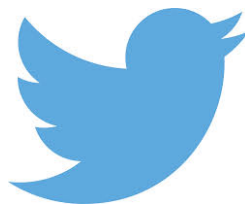
