




Family and Community



Warwick's Child Population By Race & Ethnicity, 2010



• Child population fell 15.7% between 2000 and 2010 from 18,780 to 15,825. It is becoming more diverse with 73% being White, non-Hispanic in 2010, compared to 92% in 2000.




Children in Single Parent Families



- Between 2010 and 2012, 40% of single-parent households lived in poverty compared to 8% of children in married-couple households
- Seventy-six percent of all poor children in Rhode Island lived in a single-parent family during same period.



Mother's Education Level, 2008–2012



- Strong links between parent education levels and a child's health and education outcomes.
- Warwick has a higher rate of mothers with a Bachelor's degree or above (46%) than in the state as a whole (35%).



Economic Well-Being

Child Poverty Defined, 2013

Poverty level

- > \$18,769 for a family of three with two children
- > \$23,624 for a family of four with two children

Extreme poverty level

- > \$9,385 for a family of three with two children
- > \$11,812 for a family of four with two children.

2012 Rhode Island Standard of Need

Single parent with two young children would need \$49,272/year to pay basic living



Children in Poverty, by Race and Ethnicity, Rhode Island, 2010-2012





- Half of all poor children in Rhode Island are White,
- **BUT** minority children are much more likely to be living in poverty than their White peers.



Cost of Housing

Average Cost of a Two-Bedroom Apartment 2004-2013



To afford the average rent in Rhode Island without a cost burden...

A worker would need to earn 3 times the state's 2013 minimum wage of \$7.75 per hour.

A family of three living at the poverty level in Warwick...

would have to devote 78% of its household income to the cost of rent.

Homeless Children & Youth

In 2013, 1,117 children stayed in a homeless shelter or a domestic violence shelter in RI.

Warwick was the last permanent residence for 37 of these children.

During the 2012-2013 school year, Rhode Island public school personnel identified 923 children as homeless.

➤ Warwick Public Schools personnel identified 72 children as homeless.



In October 2013

- 2,742 Warwick children were receiving SNAP benefits
- 69% increase from 2008

Cash Assistance Caseload, Rhode Island, 1997-2013*





- 67% decline in the Rhode Island cash assistance caseload.
- 2% (324) of children in Warwick were receiving cash assistance.
- 69% of RI Works beneficiaries are children under age 18.
- In SFY 2014, the state budget included no state general revenue for cash assistance.



Children Participating in School Breakfast

% of Eligible Low-Income Children Participating in School Breakfast, 2013




- Providing free breakfast to all children regardless of income can increase school breakfast participation and can reduce administrative costs.
- Students who eat breakfast have significantly higher math and reading scores, fewer absences, improved attentiveness and lower incidences of social and behavioral problems.

- In Rhode Island in 2013
 - > 5.4% of children under age 18 were uninsured
 - Rhode Island ranks 16th best in the country
- Children in families with incomes up to 250% FPL are eligible for RIte Care.

Mother:

Under Age 20

Unmarried

More likely to grow up in poverty

More likely to suffer from abuse or neglect

Less likely to be ready for school at kindergarten entry


Less likely to perform well in school
Less likely to complete high school

In 2013...

- > 290 (3%) Rhode Island babies were born with all three risk factors.
- > 12 (2%) Warwick babies were born at highest risk.

Children with Elevated Blood Lead Levels





- The CDC lowered threshold for elevated blood lead level from 10 mcg/dL to 5 mcg/dL.
- 729 Warwick children due to enter kindergarten in the fall of 2014
 - \triangleright 31 (4.3%) were confirmed positive for ≥5 mcg/dL (new level)



Births to Teens, 2008–2012



• In Warwick between 2008 and 2012, 20 births were repeat teen births, making up 10.6% of the total 188 teen births in Warwick during that period.



- Nationally, 2,711 children and youth under age 20 were killed by firearms during 2010
 - > 86% (2,331) were ages 15 to 19
- In Rhode Island in 2013,
 - ➤ 6% of high school students reported they carried a gun in the past 30 days.



Juveniles Referred to Family Court and at the Training School

Juveniles in the Care and Custody of the Rhode Island Training School, Calendar Years 2004-2013



- Major decreases in youth referred to Family Court and in the custody of Training School.
- In 2013, 17 youth from Warwick passed through the Training School—3% of the total youth who passed through



Child Abuse & Neglect

Victims of Child Abuse and Neglect per 1,000 children 2013



- In 2013 in Warwick, there were 120 victims of child abuse and neglect, a rate of 7.6 per 1,000 children.
- Almost half (46%) of RI child abuse and neglect victims were under the age of 6.



Education




Head Start and Early Head Start

- **Head Start:** In 2013, 6% of Warwick children ages 3 to 4 were enrolled.
- In Rhode Island, Head Start served
 - > 33% of the estimated 6,199 income-eligible children ages 3 to 4
 - > 9% of all children ages 3 to 4
- Early Head Start: In 2013, 2% of Warwick children under age 3 were enrolled.
- In Rhode Island, Early Head Start served
 - > 6% of the estimated 8,852 income-eligible children under age 3
 - ➤ 1% of all children under age 3

Preschool Special Education





• In Warwick, 7% of children ages 3 to 5 were enrolled in preschool special education.

Children in Full-Day Public Kindergarten Programs, Rhode Island, 2001-2002 through 2013-2014 School Years





- In 2013-2014
 - > 70% of Rhode Island children were in full-day programs
 - > 76% of U.S. children were in full-day programs
- During the 2013-2014 school year, 22 school districts offered universal access to full-day kindergarten programs. In Warwick, 11% of children were in full-day programs.



Student Mobility

Student Mobility Rate Four Core Cities and Rhode Island 2012-2013




- Students who change schools mid-year are absent more often, suspended more often and perform worse in reading and math than their peers who do not change schools.
- The mobility rate in Warwick is 12%, just below the state's mobility rate of 13%.

Chronic Absence Rates in Rhode Island by Grade, 2012-2013 School Year



- **Definition:** The percentage of students who have missed at least 10% of the school year (i.e., 18 days or more), including excused and unexcused absences.
- 8% of Warwick children (234 children) in grades K-3 were chronically absent
 - Less than the state rate of 12%

School Attendance







- During the 2012-2013 school year,
 - ➤ 15% of Warwick middle school students missed 18+ days
 - > 21% of Warwick high school students missed 18+ days



Reading Skills

Fourth-Grade Reading Proficiency % At or Above the Proficiency Level Four Core Cities and Rhode Island, 2005 & 2013



- Between 2005 and 2013, Warwick's 4th grade reading proficiency rate has increased from 71% to 78%.
- Between 2005 and 2013, Warwick's 8th grade reading proficiency rate has increased from 59% to 75% and is now slightly higher than the state rate of 74%.

- In 2013, Warwick's four year graduation rate was 77%,
 - A slight drop from 79% during class of 2012
 - > 3% lower than statewide rate
