


### Child Population, 2010




- Child population down 11% from 2000

### Child Poverty Defined, 2013

### Poverty level

- >\$18,769 for a family of 3
- >\$23,624 for a family of 4

### Extreme poverty level

- >\$9,385 for a family of 3
- >\$11,812 for a family of 4

#### 2012 Rhode Island Standard of Need

Single-parent family with 2 children would need \$49,272 a year to meet its basic needs

### **Concentrated Child Poverty**

 Almost two-thirds (64%) of Rhode Island's children living in poverty live in just 4 cities.



To afford the average rent in Rhode Island without a cost burden...

A worker would need to earn nearly 3 times the state's 2013 minimum wage of \$7.75 per hour.

A family of three living at the poverty level in Woonsocket...

would have to devote 59% of its household income to the cost of rent.



#### Homeless Children

# In 2013, 1,117 children stayed in a homeless shelter or a domestic violence shelter in RI.


➤ Woonsocket was the last permanent residence for more than 9% (104) of these children (2<sup>nd</sup> largest number in the state behind Providence).

# During the 2012-2013 school year, Rhode Island public school personnel identified 923 children as homeless.

Woonsocket Public Schools personnel identified 105 children as homeless.

#### Cash Assistance Caseload, Rhode Island, 1997-2013\*



- 67% decline in Rhode Island cash assistance caseload.
- 12% (1,232) of children in Woonsocket receive cash assistance.
- 69% of RI Works beneficiaries are children under age 18.
- In SFY 2014, for the fifth year in a row, the state budget included no state general revenue for cash assistance.

#### Participation in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, Children and Adults, Rhode Island, 2004-2013





- 5,064 Woonsocket children were receiving SNAP benefits.
- 46% increase from 2008, but a 1% decrease since 2012.

# % of Low-Income Children Participating in School Breakfast, 2013




 1 of 5 school districts which offers free breakfast to all children regardless of income.

#### In Rhode Island between 2010 and 2012

- 6.0% of children under age 18 were uninsured
- Rhode Island ranks 10th best in the country
- 71% of uninsured children are income-eligible for RIte Care.

### Child:

9 times more likely to grow up in poverty

More likely to suffer from abuse or neglect

Less likely to be ready for school at kindergarten entry

Less likely to perform well in school


Less likely to complete high school

#### In 2013...

- > 290 (3%) Rhode Island babies were born with all three risk factors
- > 34 (6%) Woonsocket babies were born at highest risk. Compared to 10% in 2010, 8% in 2011, and 6% in 2012.

- Families are enrolled in Healthy Families America, Nurse-Family Partnership, and Parents as Teachers programs.








- 589 Woonsocket children due to enter kindergarten in the fall of 2015 were tested.
  - $\triangleright$  59 (10.0%) were confirmed positive for ≥5 mcg/dL.

- Teen birth rate on the decline nationally and in Rhode Island.
- 67.3 teen births per 1,000 girls ages 15-19 in Woonsocket from 2008-2012, second highest rate in the state.
- In Woonsocket, between 2008 and 2012, 83 births were repeat teen births, making up 19.6% of the 424 total teen births during that period.





<sup>\*</sup>Status offenses are age-related acts that would not be punishable if the offender were an adult, such as truancy and disobedient conduct.

<sup>\*\*</sup>Other includes offenses such as conspiracy, crank/obscene phone calls, computer crimes and possession of a manipulative device for automobiles, etc. Probation violations, contempt of court, and other violations of court orders are not included in the offenses above.

## Juveniles in the Care and Custody of the Rhode Island Training School, Calendar Years 2004-2013



- 498 youth were in the care or custody of the Training School at some point during 2013, down from 1,069 in 2004.
- 28 youth from Woonsocket were at the Training School at some point during 2013.



#### On September 30, 2013:

- ➤ 107 incarcerated parents with a known in-state residence identified Woonsocket as their last place of residence.
- > These parents reported 254 children.
- ➤ Woonsocket had the highest rate (25.7 per 1,000 children) of children with incarcerated parents in the state.

### Child Abuse and Neglect




- Woonsocket had the highest child abuse and neglect victim rate in Rhode Island.
- Vast majority of child abuse and neglect victims statewide experienced neglect (79%).

#### **Child Care Subsidies**












### Head Start and Early Head Start

#### Access to Head Start for Low-Income Children, Rhode Island, 2013




### Access to Early Head Start for Low-Income Children and Pregnant Women, Rhode Island, 2013

#### Rhode Island State Pre-K Funded Slots, 2009-2010 through 2013-2014




#### Children in Full-Day Public Kindergarten Programs, Rhode Island, 2001-2002 through 2013-2014 School Years




- 70% of Rhode Island kindergartners were in full-day programs during the 2013-2014 school year.



 During the 2012-2013 school year, 8% of Woonsocket students were ELL students, compared with 7% of all Rhode Island students.




#### Fourth-Grade Reading Skills



- Between 2005 and 2013, Woonsocket's 4<sup>th</sup> grade reading proficiency rate increased from 46% to 53%; however the rate has declined since peaking at 59% in 2010 and 2011.
- Reading proficiency rates in Woonsocket remain well below the state rate.

#### Math Proficiency, Woonsocket, 2005 and 2013




Note: 2007 is the first year that 11th grade students participated in the NECAP.

- Woonsocket has seen improvements in math proficiency at all grade levels since 2005 but progress has stalled in recent years for 4<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders.
- Woonsocket continues to have one of the lowest math proficiency rates in the state.



#### **Chronic Early Absence**









- During the 2012-2013 school year, Woonsocket had the highest suspension rate in the state (87 suspensions per 100 students)
  - > 674 out-of-school suspensions
  - 4,268 in-school suspensions



### High School Graduation Rate, 2007-2013



- The Woonsocket 4-year graduation rate for the Class of 2013 was 61%, the dropout rate was 21%, 4% completed their GED within 4 years of entering high school, and 14% were still in school in the fall of 2013.
- •Some students may take more than 4 years to graduate. For Woonsocket students that began school in 2007-2008, 4.1% graduated in 5 years and 0.4% graduated in 6 years.



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
