# Rhode Island KIDS COUNT Makes Data Local at 'Woonsocket Data in Your Backyard' Event

Woonsocket has the highest rates of child poverty and extreme poverty in the state

School Breakfast Program participation rates continue to increase

Education outcomes need improvement

**Woonsocket, RI, (September 25, 2015)** – At the *Woonsocket Data in Your Backyard* presentation, Rhode Island KIDS COUNT Policy Analyst John Neubauer led a data-driven community discussion on the well-being of Woonsocket children and families. The presentation's data comes from the *2015 Rhode Island Kids Count Factbook*, and includes improvements and declines in economic well-being, education, health, child welfare, and safety.

The *Woonsocket Data in Your Backyard* presentation was held on Friday, September 25, 2015 from 9:00am – 10:30am at Connecting for Children and Families at The Chaplin-Perez Center, 37 Center Street, Woonsocket, RI.

Improvements and declines discussed at the *Data in Your Backyard* presentation include:

# Woonsocket has the highest rates of poverty and extreme poverty among children in the state

Although childhood poverty exists in every Rhode Island community, it is particularly concentrated in the core cities of Providence, Central Falls, Pawtucket, and Woonsocket. Children in poverty, especially those who experience poverty in early childhood and for extended periods, are more likely to have physical and behavioral health problems, experience difficulty in school, become teen parents, and earn less or be unemployed as adults.

The poverty data are based on the federal poverty threshold which is defined for 2014 as an income of \$19,073 for a family of three with two children and \$24,008 for a family of four with two children. A family is in extreme poverty if their income is less than half the poverty threshold (\$9,537 for a family of three). In Woonsocket, 42.8% of all children live in poverty, and 19.5% of all children live in extreme poverty. These rates are the highest in the state.

"We know that living in poverty negatively impacts children now, and far into their future. Having the highest child poverty rate in the state is a strong call to action for Woonsocket," said Elizabeth Burke Bryant, Executive Director of Rhode Island KIDS COUNT. "Today's *Data in Your Backyard* event is an important opportunity to discuss strategies that can be implemented for children and families in Woonsocket to succeed."

#### School Breakfast Program participation rates continue to increase

Students who eat breakfast have higher math and reading scores, fewer absences, improved attentiveness, and lower incidences of social and emotional problems.

Woonsocket offers Universal School Breakfast, which provides free breakfast to all students regardless of income. In many Woonsocket schools, breakfast is offered right in the classroom, which helps more children get a healthy meal to start the day.

In October 2014, 44% of eligible Woonsocket children participated in the Universal School Breakfast Program. With an average of 1,885 children participating out of 4,287 eligible, Woonsocket has the fourth highest school breakfast participation rate in the state.

"Woonsocket's strategies to increase school breakfast participation are paying off," said Neubauer. "Woonsocket's participation rate is now 44%, compared to 35% in 2012. By offering Universal School Breakfast – and in some cases, breakfast right in the classroom – Woonsocket prioritizes the health and education of their most vulnerable children."

#### **Education outcomes continue to need improvement**

High rate of chronic absence: Regular attendance at school is an essential step for children to succeed academically and do well in life. Students who are frequently absent from school miss critical academic and social learning opportunities and are at risk of disengagement from school, academic failure, and dropping out.

- In Woonsocket, almost one in three (31%) K-3 students missed 18+ days of school during the 2013-2014 school year, tied for highest in the state.
- Woonsocket's chronic absence rate in high school was 45% during the 2013-2014 school year, the highest in the state.

Low high school graduation rate: High school graduation is the minimum requisite for college and most employment. In Rhode Island, adults without high school diplomas are over four times as likely to be unemployed as those with bachelor's degrees or more.

- The Woonsocket 4-year graduation rate for the Class of 2014 was 58%, the dropout rate was 25%, 6% completed their GED within 4 years of entering high school, and 12% were still in school in the fall of 2014.
- Woonsocket had the highest dropout rate and lowest 4-year graduation rate in the state.
