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Rhode Island KIDS COUNT Makes Data Local at Warwick Data in Your Backyard Event

Community event will discuss the well-being of Warwick children and families

Warwick, RI (October 24, 2016) – At the *Warwick Data in Your Backyard* event, Rhode Island KIDS COUNT Senior Policy Analyst Stephanie Geller presented data on the well-being of Warwick children and youth to an audience of community leaders and policy makers. The presentation's data comes from the <u>2016 Rhode Island Kids Count Factbook</u>, and includes improvements and declines in children and youth in Warwick. The presentation was brought to the community in partnership with the Warwick Coalition to Prevent Child Abuse and was held on Monday, October 24, 2016 from 9:30 a.m. — 11:00 a.m. at the Warwick Public Library, 600 Sandy Lane, Warwick, RI.

"We're proud to partner with the Warwick Coalition to Prevent Child Abuse on this *Data in Your Backyard* presentation," said Elizabeth Burke Bryant, Executive Director of Rhode Island KIDS COUNT. "This annual event is great way to assess progress and challenges, as well as to lift up strategies that Warwick can take to support better outcomes for its children and families."

Economic Snapshot

- Children in poverty: In 2015, the federal poverty threshold was \$19,096 for a family of three with two children and \$24,036 for a family of four with two children. The extreme poverty level in 2015 was \$9,548 for a family of three with two children and \$12,018 for a family of four with two children. Warwick's child poverty rate of 8.9% is less than half the state rate of 20.1%. However, as one of Rhode Island's largest communities, Warwick has over 1,300 children living in poverty.
- *Cost of housing:* The average monthly cost of rent in Warwick is \$1,346, above the statewide average of \$1,238.
- *Homeless children:* During the 2014-2015 school year, Warwick Public Schools identified 85 children as homeless, an increase from 74 children the year prior.
- Low WIC Participation: The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) is a federally-funded preventive program that provides participants with nutritious food, nutrition education, and access to health care and social services. In Warwick in 2015, 48% of eligible children participated in WIC, lower than the state rate of 59%. Warwick's WIC participation has been declining annually over the past four years 62% of eligible children participated in 2012. Young children who are eligible for WIC but not participating are more likely to be in poor health, at risk for developmental delays, underweight, short for their age, and/or experience food insecurity than those who participate.

Child Abuse and Neglect

Children need love, affection, and nurturing from their parents or caregivers for healthy physical and emotional development. Experiencing child abuse or neglect can have lifelong negative consequences for a child's health, well-being, and relationships with others.

• In 2015, there were 107 Warwick children who were victims of child abuse and neglect, a rate of 6.8 victims per 1,000 children ages birth to 18. This is an improvement from the year prior (9.7 victims per 1,000 children in 2014), and lower than the 2015 state rate of 13.8 victims per 1,000 children.

Infant Outcomes

Warwick ranks better than the state as a whole in three categories of infant health.

- *Delayed prenatal care:* Women receiving late or no prenatal care are at increased risk of poor birth outcomes. In Warwick, 10.2% of pregnant women received delayed prenatal care between 2010-2014, compared to 12.4% of pregnant women in the state as a whole.
- Low birthweight: An infant's birthweight is a key indicator of newborn health, and low birthweight infants are at greater risk for physical and developmental problems than infants of normal weight. At 6.5%, the percentage of infants born low birthweight in Warwick is below Rhode Island's percentage of 7.5%.
- Births to mothers with less than a high school diploma: Parental education attainment can have an impact on many aspects of child well-being, with children with parents that have higher educational attainment having better economic, health, and education outcomes. At 6%, Warwick's percentage of births to mothers with less than a high school education is less than half the state rate of 13%. Nearly half (48%) of babies from Warwick had mothers with a bachelor's degree or above, compared with 36% in Rhode Island.

Warwick Public Education

- Room for improvement in reading proficiency: In 2015, 37% of Warwick third-grade students met expectations in reading according to the *Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC)* test, which is the same as Rhode Island's overall rate. Proficiency in third-grade reading is vital for children's success, because children who do not read proficiently by the end of third grade are four times more likely to drop out of high school than their peers.
- *School breakfast participation is low:* Students who eat breakfast perform better in school they have higher math and reading scores, fewer absences, improved attentiveness, and lower incidences of social and emotional problems. In 2015, 18% of eligible Warwick children participated in the School Breakfast Program, compared to the state rate of 40%.
- *Graduation rate:* In 2015, 81% of Warwick high school students graduated from high school, compared to the state rate of 83%.
