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RI Alliance for College and Career Readiness Annual Convening: Working Towards Equity Together



Providence, RI (December 6, 2019) – More than 120 students, parents, teachers, policymakers, and community, higher education, and business leaders will gather on December 9, 2019 from 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. to focus on the urgent need for equity in college and career readiness. Participants will collectively brainstorm how to work together to help all Rhode Island students gain the skills and knowledge, support, and financial resources they need to be successful in college and careers.

Working Toward Equity Together – A Convening for Collective Action

"Although there has been growth in college and career readiness opportunities in Rhode Island, there continue to be gaps in both college credits and industry-recognized credentials earned by high school students by race, ethnicity, income, and special education and English/multilingual learner status," said Paige Clausius Parks, Senior Policy Analyst at Rhode Island KIDS COUNT (and Coordinator of

the Alliance). "At this convening, attendees will listen to compelling presentations and engage in interactive discussions about how Rhode Island can achieve equitable access to advanced coursework, address financial barriers to college attendance and completion and how to ensure the Rhode Island Promise Scholarship addresses equity. We will not be admiring the problem, but instead actively brainstorming solutions to work towards equity together."

The keynote speaker will be Steve Colón, CEO of <u>Bottom Line</u> and Board Vice President of <u>National</u> <u>College Access Network</u>; and he will discuss *What It Really Takes to Achieve Equity in College Access and Success.* The event will feature PechaKucha Presentations on the following topics:

- 1. Equitable Access to College and Career Readiness Opportunities
- 2. Is Rhode Island Ready for a FAFSA High School Graduation Requirement?
- 3. Rhode Island Promise Scholarship
