

# Child Poverty Defined, 2016

#### **Poverty level**

- >\$19,337 for a family of 3
- >\$24,339 for a family of 4

#### **Extreme poverty level**

- >\$9,669 for a family of 3
- >\$12,170 for a family of 4

#### 2016 Rhode Island Standard of Need

➤ Single-parent family with 2 children would need \$52,932 a year to meet its basic needs



## **Homeless Children**


In 2016, 966 children stayed in a homeless shelter or a domestic violence shelter in RI.

➤ Newport Public Schools personnel identified 71 children as homeless.






# Early Learning Programs Participating in BrightStars

BrightStars Quality Ratings for Early Learning Centers, Family Child Care Programs, and Public Schools, Rhode Island, 2012 and 2017





## Children Enrolled in State Pre-K


#### Rhode Island State Pre-K Funded Slots, 2010-2011 through 2016-2017



# Third-Graders Meeting Expectations in English Language Arts, 2015-2017


