"College is expensive and you get the opportunity to take a class that counts as college credit. That is one less college class to pay for."




Need to Address Barriers to Access

"I have heard some students who are English language learners saying they felt that they weren't getting exposed to as many opportunities as the other English speaking students. They can be kind of segregated from the other part of the school."

"I wanted to do this program on the weekends, but me and my mom struggled to find the right schedule where she could pick me up, so transportation is a problem."

Focused attention on policy strategies and investments to close disparities in education outcomes by race, ethnicity, and income and further investment in high-quality English-language learner instruction and supports.




Policy Agenda

- Increase access to advanced coursework at the middle and high school level and reduce barriers to access these programs, particularly for low-income students
 - Dual and Concurrent Enrollment
 - Advanced Coursework Network
 - AP courses
- Ensure that the implementation of Individual Learning Plans (ILPs)
 supports student exploration of college and careers and the
 building of skills to reach their personal, academic, and career goals
- Expand the RI Promise Scholarship
 - Include students attending four-year colleges
 - Pay for living expenses in addition to tuition and fees for the lowest income students
