



Child Population, 2010







Poverty by Race/Ethnicity




Homeless Children

In 2017, 998 children stayed in a homeless shelter, domestic violence shelter, or transitional housing facility in RI.

- During the 2016-2017 school year, Rhode Island public school personnel identified 1,245 children as homeless.
 - Woonsocket Public Schools personnel identified
 91 children as homeless.


% of Children Participating in School Breakfast, 2017









 - 36 (6.0%) were confirmed positive for ≥5 mcg/dL.


- 43.7 teen births per 1,000 girls ages 15-19 in Woonsocket, second highest rate in the state.
- 52 births were repeat teen births, making up 19% of the 276 total teen births during that period.









- 379 youth were in the care or custody of the Training School at some point during 2017, down from 1,037 in 2008.
- 25 of these youth were from Woonsocket.



On September 30, 2017:

- ➤ 101 incarcerated parents with a known in-state residence identified Woonsocket as their last place of residence.
- These parents reported 253 children
- > Only West Warwick has a higher rate of children with incarcerated parents.

Child Abuse and Neglect





- Woonsocket's child abuse and neglect victim rate is the highest in the state.
- Vast majority of child abuse and neglect victims statewide experienced neglect (82%).



BrightStars Quality Ratings for Early Learning Centers, Family Child Care Programs, and Public Schools Rhode Island, 2017 and 2018





In Woonsocket:

- •100% of the 9 child care centers and preschools participate in BrightStars.
 - >44% (4 of 9) have a high-quality rating of 4 or 5 stars
- •100% of 6 family child care homes participate in BrightStars.
 - So far, none have a high-quality rating of 4 or 5 stars

Percent of Children Enrolled in Head Start or State Pre-K the Year before Kindergarten, Rhode Island, 2017-2018





Students Ages Birth to 21 Receiving Early Intervention and Special Education Services, Rhode Island, June 2017




Third-Graders Meeting Expectations in English Language Arts, 2015-2017


Math Proficiency, Woonsocket, 2015-2017

Chronic Early Absence








