





Woonsocket's Child Population by Race & Ethnicity, 2010




 Child population fell 11% between 2000 and 2010 from 11,155 to 9,888. It is becoming more diverse with 52% being White, non-Hispanic in 2010, compared to 65% in 2000.

- >\$19,096 for a family of 3
- >\$24,036 for a family of 4

Extreme poverty level

- >\$9,548 for a family of 3
- >\$12,018 for a family of 4

2014 Rhode Island Standard of Need

Single-parent family with 2 children would need \$51,492 a year to meet its basic needs



Children in Poverty, by Race and Ethnicity, Rhode Island, 2010-2014



Average Cost of a Two-Bedroom Apartment, 2006-2015




- To afford the average rent in Rhode Island without a cost burden...
 - A worker would need to earn more than 2.5 times the state's 2015 minimum wage of \$9 per hour.
- A family of three living at the poverty level in Woonsocket...
 - > would have to devote 63% of its household income to the cost of rent.


Homeless Children

In 2015, 988 children stayed in a homeless shelter or a domestic violence shelter in RI.

- During the 2014-2015 school year, Rhode Island public school personnel identified 1,031 children as homeless.
 - Woonsocket Public Schools personnel identified 100 children as homeless.

Children in Families Receiving Cash Assistance







Participation in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, Children and Adults, Rhode Island, 2006-2015





% of Low-Income Children Participating in School Breakfast, 2015




All 4 school districts offers free breakfast to all children regardless of income.

Low-Income Children Participating in the School Breakfast Program, Rhode Island, October 2015





- Data released in September showed that in Rhode Island in 2015
 - 3.4% of children under age 18 were uninsured
 - Rhode Island ranks 15th best in the country



In 2015...

- 240 (2%) Rhode Island babies were born with all three risk factors
- 20 (4%) Woonsocket babies were born at highest risk.
 - Compared to 10% in 2010, 8% in 2011, 6% in 2012, 6% in 2013, and 4% in 2014.


 81 families in Woonsocket are enrolled in Healthy Families America, Nurse-Family Partnership, and Parents as Teachers home visiting programs.



- 597 Woonsocket children due to enter kindergarten in the fall of 2017 were tested.
 - 36 (6.0%) were confirmed positive for ≥5 mcg/dL.

- Teen birth rate on the decline nationally and in Rhode Island.
- 56.3 teen births per 1,000 girls ages 15-19 in Woonsocket from 2010-2014, second highest rate in the state.
- In Woonsocket, between 2010 and 2014, 71 births were repeat teen births, making up 20% of the 355 total teen births during that period.







^{**}Other includes offenses such as conspiracy, crank/obscene phone calls, computer crimes, and possession of a manipulative device for automobiles, etc. Probation violations, contempt of court, and other violations of court orders are not included in the offenses above.


Youth at the Training School





- 470 youth were in the care or custody of the Training School at some point during 2015, down from 1,123 in 2006.
- In 2008, the Rhode Island General Assembly instituted a cap on the number of youth at the Training School. On any given day, the limit is 148 boys and 12 girls.


On September 30, 2015:

- ➤ 114 incarcerated parents with a known in-state residence identified Woonsocket as their last place of residence.
- > These parents reported 260 children
- > Only Providence has a higher rate of children with incarcerated parents.


In Woonsocket:

- ■100% of the 9 child care centers and preschools participate in BrightStars.
 - ≥56% (5 of 9) have a high-quality rating of 4 or 5 stars
- •100% of 6 family child care homes participate in BrightStars.
 - So far, none have a high-quality rating of 4 or 5 stars




Head Start and Early Head Start

Access to Head Start for Children in Poverty, Rhode Island, 2015




Access to Early Head Start for Low-Income Children and Pregnant Women, Rhode Island, 2015



Children Enrolled in State Pre-K




Rhode Island State Pre-K Funded Slots, 2010-2011 through 2015-2016

Child Care Subsidies






Students Ages Birth to 21 Receiving Early Intervention and Special Education Services, Rhode Island, June 2015



 In Woonsocket, 22% of children in grades K-12 in June 2015 were receiving special education services, the highest rate in the state.


Third-Grade Reading Skills

Math Skills


Math Proficiency, Woonsocket, 2015-2016



- Woonsocket's math proficiency rates have been increasing overall but continue to be far below the rates for the state as a whole.
- In third grade, 44% of Rhode Island students meet expectations, compared to 25% of Woonsocket students.
- In seventh grade, 28% of Rhode Island students meet expectations, compared to 11% of Woonsocket students.

Chronic Early Absence





• In Woonsocket, almost one in three (32%) of K-3 students missed 18+ days of school during the 2014-2015 school year, the highest in the state.



- Woonsocket had the highest suspension rate during the 2014-2015 school year with 86 suspensions per 100 students, compared to 19 for the state as a whole.
 - However, only 14% of Woonsocket school suspensions were out-of-school suspensions, compared to 95% for the state as a whole.

High School Graduation Rate, 2008-2015



- The Woonsocket 4-year graduation rate for the Class of 2015 was 63%, the dropout rate was 20%, 2% completed their GED within 4 years of entering high school, and 16% were still in school in the fall of 2015.
- •Woonsocket had the highest dropout rate and lowest 4-year graduation rate in the state.
