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Testimony Re: House Bill 7300, An Act Relating to Criminal Offenses – Weapons

House Judiciary Committee

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Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony today. We would also like to thank Representative Caldwell for sponsoring this important bill and Representatives Kazarian, Craven, Knight, Slater, Kislak, Potter, Fogarty, Amore, and Biah for co-sponsoring. Rhode Island KIDS COUNT would like to voice its support for House Bill 7300, which would make it a violation for the owner of any firearm to store or leave the firearm unsecured. Failure to store the firearm properly would subject the owner to a fine of not more than three thousand dollars (\$3000). Additionally, if the owner of a firearm fails to store or leaves a firearm unsecured in a place where they reasonably know a child can likely gain access and it results in an injury or death to a child, the owner would be guilty of a felony and would be punished by up to five years imprisonment, a fine of up to five thousand dollars (\$5,000), or both.

Nationally and in Rhode Island, gun reform remains a key area of focus, especially in the wake of several tragic school and mass shootings over the past decade. Rhode Island KIDS COUNT believes comprehensive state policies to reduce gun violence are long overdue. **House Bill 7300 is a practical step to reduce gun injuries and increase the safety of children in Rhode Island.**

In Rhode Island between 2015 and 2019, there were 145 emergency department visits, 31 hospitalizations, and 7 deaths of children and youth due to guns.

This law would encourage families to store guns safely, which would reduce the likelihood of a child being injured, hospitalized, or killed by a gun that he or she has found unlocked and unsecured. It would also reduce the likelihood that a child, teen, or adult could gain access to a gun and use it to take his or her own life, a risk that is particularly urgent with the increase in depression and suicidality we have seen in association with the COVID-19 pandemic.

We strongly urge you to pass House Bill 7300, which would require gun owners to store guns securely in locked containers equipped with tamper-resistant mechanical locks engaged to make the guns inoperable. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.
